Forty-five fathers were educated and supported through Catholic Charities MISTER Parenting Program.

Tyler's Justice Center for Children provided program coordination and advocacy for 51 children who were abused and non-offending family members.

VOICES Domestic Violence Program provided safe transitional housing for ten women who were abused and families.

Amity Day Care and Learning Center provided an accredited, safe, learning environment for 330 children.

101 at-risk boys and girls gained a new friend when they were matched with a Big Brother or Big Sister, a program of FHN Family Counseling Center.

Neighborhood Housing Services helped 79 families achieve their dream of owning a home.

675 individuals and 32 teens received information and referral from CONTACT.

Norman C. Sleezer Youth Home worked with 25 girls through their Outreach Counseling Program.

Ninety-three income-eligible working parents received child care scholarships at the Family YMCA of Northwest Illinois.

Intensive work training was provided by Malcolm Eaton Enterprises to 14 individuals with disabilities for them to be successful in seeking community employment.

Twelve families were given aid and assistance from the American Red Cross after experiencing a disaster in their homes.

445 children received tutoring and life-skills activities from the Boys and Girls Club of Freeport and Stephenson County.

Freeport Area Church Cooperative's housing program assisted four chronically homeless men and women who were also disabled.

5,233 individuals received food from the Salvation Army's Community Kitchen.
